CHAPTER PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE MARCH 2025

To all our Chapter and Auxiliary members, Happy Spring! The cherry blossoms are in full bloom, our Nationals baseball team has taken the field at Nats Park, the grass is very green at our Algonkian Regional Golf Course, and, best of all, the winter frost is fast becoming a distant memory. Spring is always an uplifting time of year in so many ways -- and this year is no exception.

In early February, our Chapter's Board of Directors met in a special session to take stock of our Chapter's mission, programs, and budget. This meeting was prompted by an apparent lack of interest by the membership in assuming Chapter leadership positions and lower (than in previous years) total contributions received in our last annual solicitation campaign (conducted in the fall of 2024).

In terms of our Chapter's leadership, we continue to have difficulty in recruiting candidates to volunteer to take over key officer and director positions in the Chapter -- my position as Chapter President being the most notable. In this regard, there is one piece of good news – Donna Everage has agreed to become our Chapter Secretary Thank you, Donna. After considerable discussion, the Board concluded that we need more and better

publicity in the Falcons Landing community – reminding residents of what MOAA is as a national organization and what our Chapter does everyday to serve our Falcons Landing and Loudoun County communities. To that end, we recently created a MOAA video commercial for periodic airing on Channel 970 to "help get the word out."

Regarding our Chapter's mission and set of programs, the Board felt we still have our mission exactly right in emulating MOAA National's mission – to support those who are serving, those who have served, and those who have survived – with special emphasis on supporting Loudoun County veterans via our Loudoun Veterans and Family Support (LVFS) program. The Board also reaffirmed our Chapter's set of recurring programs (described throughout this Newsletter) with no particular expansion needed.

Finally, with regard to the Chapter's budget, our contributions during last year's Solicitation Campaign netted approximately \$2000 less that the previous year – so some adjustment in this year's budget became necessary. After deliberation, the Board decided to increase our annual LVFS contribution from the Chapter treasury from \$5000 to \$8000 (our Chapter's top program priority) and to decrease our annual scholarship

awards from \$3000 for each of our three JROTC school to \$2000 for each school. Additionally, some minor adjustments to our budget were also necessary.

Our Chapter is healthy and we look forward to an exciting year doing the things we do. We do still urgently need to recruit new Chapter leaders to maintain our legacy of a strong MOAA presence at Falcons Landing. So fellow Chapter members, please consider volunteering to serve in a position on our Board. Thank you for your continued support.

FACT SHEET 2025

<u>The Military Officers Association of America</u> (MOAA) is the nation's largest and most influential association of military officers. It is an independent, nonprofit, politically nonpartisan organization.

The Falcons Landing Chapter (FLC) is one of more than 400-plus local organizations affiliated with National MOAA and is a member of the Virginia Council of Chapters. The Chapter is located at Falcons Landing, a Life Plan Community which is operated by the Air Force Retired Officers Community (AFROC). It is the only MOAA Chapter in Loudoun County. The Chapter is also a member of the Virginia Council of Chapters. MOAA

The mission of the Chapter is to provide programs to support: those who are serving; those who have served; and those who have survived, while placing special focus on community support.

Chapter membership is open to those who hold, or have ever held, a warrant or commission in any component of the Army, Marine Corps, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard, Space Force, Public Health Service, NOAA, and their surviving spouses.

As of March 31, 2025, there were 122 Premium Members and 68 Auxiliary Chapter Members for a total of 190 Chapter Members.

The most significant, ongoing program for the Chapter is the multifaceted local support to veterans and their families. The Chapter established the *Loudoun Veterans and Family Support (LVFS)* program in partnership with Community Lutheran Church of Sterling, providing financial and general support to Loudoun County Veterans needing assistance.

The Chapter strongly supports the <u>Loudoun County Community Veterans</u> <u>Engagement Board</u> (LCCVEB), whose purpose is promoting a healthy and enriched lifestyle for Loudoun County veterans and their family members through community outreach and advocacy on Loudoun County veterans' issues.

The Chapter sponsors the *Gathering*, a program of distinguished guest speakers for monthly presentations on current and past world and government affairs.

The Chapter has established a *Speakers' Bureau*. This initiative is in keeping with the chapter's goal of continuing to inform the American public about their military establishment. There are currently 16 topics and speakers available for presentation to the local community.

Four times a year the Chapter supports the *AdoptaPlatoon Soldier Support Effort*® dedicated to serving deployed United States Service Men and Women by providing ongoing care packages to improve quality of life and raising morale for those serving overseas in the Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corp, Coast Guard and Special Forces.

The Chapter supports three *Junior ROTC* units in our area of responsibility: the Air Force JROTC unit at Chantilly High School in Fairfax, the Navy JROTC unit at Loudoun County High School in Leesburg, and the Army JROTC unit at South Lakes High School in Reston. The Chapter President and Director of JROTC Programs present scholarships to selected cadets at each school. In addition, the Lieutenant General John Pustay Scholarship is awarded to a selected cadet at Chantilly High School.

Memorial and Veterans Day Programs are presented each year at Falcons Landing.



THE GATHERING: THE CODE OF THE WARRIOR: **HONOR AND RESPECT**

Our guest speaker and fellow resident, Gerald E. Galloway, chose a very interesting and challenging topic for the Gathering, as always, sponsored by the Falcons Landing Chapter of Military Officers Association of America (MOAA). His presentation reflected on the bonds that exist among combatants; how to look past the efforts of combat and focus on actions oriented toward post-combat reconciliation. His primary example focused on the Civil War, its end, and the first steps towards such reconciliation.

Gerry's presentation opened with the introduction of a civilian professor at Bowdoin College, Joshua Chamberlain, who joined the Union Army as a citizen who felt a responsibility to provide support during the great American Civil War. Chamberlain served with the 20th Maine, and we find him at

Gettysburg when the unit was low on ammunition, leading a charge with fixed bayonets to slow down and stop charging Confederates! By the later stages of the war, he was a Brigadier General (BG) and much noticed by General Grant. Grant and Lincoln had been discussing the coming end of the Civil War and next actions towards closure. Grant asked Chamberlain to manage the upcoming surrender by Lee.

As the North watched, BG Chamberlain conducted the ceremony of surrender of General Lee and his forces at Appomattox. However, settling scores was not what was done. Chamberlain had arranged for the now defeated enemy to stack rifles and return home on a parole with sidearms, basic supplies, horses needed to return to farming, and a shred of dignity. In fact, the Union troops along the path home for Lee and the defeated Confederates showed basic military honor recognition to their former foe. (How about that for "...forming a more perfect Union..."?!) And we have lived and benefited from that action of Lincoln, Grant and Chamberlain from then until today.)

The Gathering presentation included some other examples of the positive side of the Warrior Code including the famous Christmas Day truce of WWI and General Rommel's decision not to kill enemy prisoners of war despite Hitler's wish. General Chamberlain received the Medal of Honor, returned to Bowdoin, continued to live a long life as scholar, President of Bowdoin, and as Governor of Maine.

THE GATHERING: MOAA PRESENTS PATTON THE MOVIE

The MOAA Gathering hosted by Ben Romero on January 16, 2025, presented a discussion of the movie "Patton," with guest speakers Blane Ampthor (a returning Gathering guest speaker) and Anjuli M. Singh (a graduate student working on her PhD with the focus on movies). They provided a behind-the-scenes view of the movie, including a view of the life of General George Patton. The discussion covered preparation of the script, casting of George C. Scott in the lead as George Patton, and shooting on location in Spain with its open rural countryside, with various Spanish army military equipment from World War II for realism.

It took 20 years to get the film produced, in part because George Patton's widow, Beatrice, did not wish to have such a biography, nor did the Patton family provide any direct support. However, those who knew Patton, including General Bradley, did provide background information. Anjuli used realistic film clips from the movie to develop her presentation of the movie version of Patton. In particular, she focused on his military insights, his belief in reincarnation, his strong religious faith and the role of his chaplain in leading prayer for battle, and his support of his wounded troops and visits to them. She also discussed his intolerance of what we today call posttraumatic stress disorder (PTSD), including a famous slapping sequence.

The pluses of Patton's character certainly influenced his success in battle, his recognition as a

leader, and his promotion to general. But the minuses also had an effect, causing some limitations in his career and later assignments. The film also included reference to the Battle of the Bulge and Patton's role in how he provided troops in relief of the 101st Airborne Division, again displaying his military leadership, his drive to accomplish any mission, and his initiative.



Anjuli included a clip on the music of the film, as developed by composer Jerry Goldsmith, and which itself earned an Oscar nomination for its innovative methods of producing the music. If I listen carefully, I can still hear it in the distance. All in all, we received a very fine balanced and thorough presentation from our guest speakers. Thank you especially to Anjuli Singh for her research and preparation. If you missed this presentation. I hope you watch the replay on channel 970. In fact, I hope Falcons Landing would be able to schedule the movie for us in the future.


